PHILOSOPHY OF MINISTRY

EBI espouses the philosophy that the Word of God, Spirit of God and community of believers are the key factors in spiritual growth and ministry preparedness. For that reason, we encourage students to assume personal responsibility for their own spiritual life at EBI. This philosophy results in a broad, comprehensive program conducive to this end. We reduce the oversight of rules where possible, while training students to live according to the Word of God in consideration of others. We believe this gracious approach to working with students will prepare them for the next phase of missionary training.

THE HISTORY OF ETHNOS360 BIBLE INSTITUTE

The leadership of Ethnos360 (formerly New Tribes Mission) saw a need for solid Bible education that would prepare believers to take the Gospel to people who had never heard it. Ten students made up the first class that met in March 1955 in the former Wisconsin Tabernacle, Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Today at our physical campus in Waukesha, Wisconsin and through our online program we continue to carry out the original vision that sparked the formation of our first campus in 1955.

ETHNOS360 BIBLE INSTITUTE – PART OF ETHNOS360

Ethnos360 was founded in 1942 (as New Tribes Mission) and remains committed to taking the Gospel to unreached people groups who have yet to hear it. As the first phase of training with Ethnos360, EBI provides the biblical training necessary for a ministry with Ethnos360.

Ethnos360's training program helps prepare believers for cross-cultural evangelism and church planting. Today more than 3,000 missionaries are serving the Lord through Ethnos360 in more than two dozen countries.

Hundreds of indigenous churches are in various stages of growth in remote villages. Ethnos360 missionaries are experiencing great joy as they see God develop local church leadership and indigenous believers sending their own missionaries to share God's Word with neighboring villages and even other people groups.

ETHNOS360 BIBLE INSTITUTE'S SPECIALIZED TRAINING

Ethnos360 Bible Institute provides a solid biblical foundation for serving the Lord.

The teaching covers all 66 books of the Bible, some in overview format, while the New Testament epistles are taught verse-by-verse. Theology and ministry courses provide the opportunity to summarize the biblical teaching and the ways in which God's word is applied in ministry contexts.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS AND DEGREES

EBI offers a two-years program in Biblical Studies. Student can earn one of three available tracks.

- Diploma of Biblical Studies
- Associate of Arts Degree in Biblical Studies
- Certificate of Biblical Studies (Online campus only)

The diploma and degree can be obtained through both our physical and online campuses. The certificate track is only available through EBI Online. EBI's diploma and degree count toward a Bachelors in Intercultural Ministries through one of Ethnos360's cross-cultural training programs.

ADMISSIONS

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

To apply you must:

- Be at least age 18 (On Campus) or 17 (Online) at the time of registration.
- Be a high school graduate or have obtained a General Equivalency Diploma (GED). An official transcript is required from the high school from which you graduated.
- Live respectfully with EBI's Statement of Faith.
- Live respectfully with EBI's Code of Conduct.
- Give testimony of salvation and have a desire to study the Bible.

APPLICATION PROCESS

Applications may be completed online at www.e360bible.org. From to the home page, click "Apply" and our intuitive system will lead you through the process. If you have questions, our Admissions team is here to help.

Instructions

1. Click "Apply"
2. Enter your name and contact information, then click "Submit".
3. Two emails will be sent to you immediately. One asks you to confirm your email address and the other includes a link to access your application.
4. Your application progress is automatically saved as you complete each field.

As you progress, please be prepared to submit the following:

1. Recent photo: Portraits preferred, but we can accept other photos.
2. High school or college transcript: An official copy should be uploaded as soon as possible. If you have not yet graduated, you should upload a partial transcript immediately and request that a final transcript be sent after you graduate. (Homeschool applicants: Follow the directions listed below).
3. Three confidential references: One reference must be completed by your pastor or a church leader; the other two must be completed by non-family members.

An Admissions representative will be in touch with you throughout the application process. You can expect to receive notice of acceptance 1-2 weeks after all application requirements have been received. After acceptance, our team will reach out to you with helpful information about next steps, arrival dates, and campus life.

HOMESCHOOL APPLICANTS

A homeschool transcript will be acceptable, providing it contains the following:

- Clear listing of courses and grades achieved.
- Signature of the parent/teacher.
- Date the work was completed to indicate it is a final transcript.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

1. Important considerations before starting your application:
 - English proficiency — All of our instruction is in English. If English is not your first language, you will be required to take an English proficiency test such as the Duolingo, TOEFL, or IELTS.
 - Finances — The estimated cost (in U.S. funds) for your school fees, living expenses, travel, and travelers medical insurance for the period of two years is approximately \$35,000.00 (singles) and \$75,000.00 (married).
 - Scholarships — EBI does not have scholarships available for international students.
 - Employment — F-1 student visas prohibit international students from working off

campus. On-campus job opportunities are limited in both availability and hours, and applications can only be submitted after arriving on campus.

- Married students — Due to the nature of our training program, we require married couples to live together while enrolled and also with their minor children.

2. During the application process:

- Proof of English proficiency — Our admissions team will review your proof of English proficiency test along with your other application materials.
- Proof of funds — Our admissions team will review your proof of funds documents along with your other application materials. This can be a financial statement bearing your name or in the form of a letter written on letterhead by your financial institution documenting that the funds are available in your account. If a portion of your funds will come from supporting individuals or churches, we will also need financial documentation from those individuals.
- I-20 Immigration form — We will send this form to you only after the application has been accepted, proof of English proficiency has been approved, and proof of funds has been received.
- I-901 SEVIS fee — (Student and Exchange Visitor Information System) For more information regarding this \$350.00 fee please visit <https://www.ice.gov/sevis/i901>.
- F-1 student visa — International students must make an appointment at their US Embassy for a student visa interview. You will be required to have your I-20, I-901 payment receipt, valid passport, financial documentation, as well as evidence of ties to your home country, and a plan to return there when studies are completed. Canadians can obtain their student visa as they enter the U.S.

4. International Student Travel Insurance

- International students (non-US residents) enrolled at EBI are required to purchase and maintain Traveler's Medical Insurance for themselves (and their family if married) to cover any medical expenses they incur while in the United States. Canadian students with dual citizenship will also be required to purchase Traveler's Medical Insurance if their only source for medical coverage is the Canadian health care system. Traveler's Medical Insurance should be purchased and documentation provided to the school before arrival at Ethnos360 Bible Institute. In light of this requirement, international students will not be enrolled in or charged for Student Accident Insurance (SAI).

COMMUTER/PART-TIME STUDENTS

Full or part-time commuter status is made available for residents of the Waukesha area wishing to attend classes at EBI. Commuters are required to complete the same application as an on-campus student. If a commuter desires to move on campus at some point, they must communicate with their Dean and Admissions Office and must be enrolled in a minimum of 12 credit hours per semester.

WITHDRAWAL PROCESS

Students withdrawing from EBI mid-semester are required to see the Dean of Men or Women and the Education office for processing. The Education office will then notify the Business office to begin the process of refunding any funds in accordance with the refund policy.

TRANSFER PROCESS

Students wishing to transfer from one EBI campus to another (online to on campus, on campus to online) are required to seek input from their respective Dean, and then reach out to Admissions for a transfer request. The Admissions office will be in communication with respective departments and notify you when the process is complete.

RE-ENROLLMENT

If you've withdrawn and been gone from EBI for 12 months or longer, you will be required to reapply. Contact the Admissions Department for requirements regarding re-enrollment.

FINANCES

FINANCIAL POLICIES

Ethnos360 Bible Institute offers a low-cost education so people preparing for ministry can receive a Bible education without amassing debt.

EBI costs are low primarily because the faculty and staff are missionaries. They do not draw a salary from the school. Instead, they are supported by churches, friends and family members who see value in their work of preparing people for ministry.

All fees are shown in US dollars and are subject to change without prior notification. Current fees can be obtained by calling the Finance Office or the Admissions Department.

An initial down payment of approximately 55-60% of student fees is due August 15th and January 1 prior to registration. The balance is payable in four installments due on the first of each month. Specific details are distributed to all students prior to the start of each semester. Please note: Late fees may apply if payments are not received when due.

EBI currently does not qualify to issue IRS form 1098T.

VETERANS BENEFITS

EBI's physical campus qualifies to accept VA education benefits under U.S. Code, Title 38, Section 3676. At this time, EBI is not able to accept benefits for students who are enrolled in an online format.

Veterans Refund Policy: This policy applies only to those students currently enrolled in any courses

at EBI who are receiving educational benefits. The non-refundable portion of any registration fees will not exceed \$10.00 and other fees will not exceed the pro-rate portion of total charges that the length of the completed portion of the course bears to the total length of the course.

SCHOLARSHIPS

EBI has a limited number of scholarships available for students associated with EBI ministry partners. These ministry partners include AWANA, IFCA, Word of Life, and Caravan Ministries. Subject to availability.

STUDENT REFUND POLICY

Prior to enrollment, all fees paid by the applicant, excluding the application fee, shall be refunded if the application is denied.

Non-Refundable Charges: Upon enrollment at EBI, certain fees are non-refundable, including the registration fee, Student Accident Insurance (charged fully in fall, half for spring enrollees), early withdrawal administration fee, and the semester Logos Bible Software fee (unless purchased outright).

Refundable Charges: Facility fees, housing, meals, utilities, notes, and tech fees are pro-rated throughout the semester. Room deposits are refunded after inspection by the Student Life Department, provided no damage or outstanding balance exists.

Scholarships and Financial Assistance: EBI scholarship funds are not repaid to students upon withdrawal or dismissal and are redirected to the EBI scholarship fund. Outside organization scholarships may be refunded to the provider if stipulated, subject to the student's final balance. Global Partners Strategic Equipping Fund refunds follow Ethnos360's policy. Refunds to outside organizations are limited to the amount EBI owes the student, with any remaining balance to be collected directly from the student by the organization.

STUDENT LIFE

The Student Life Team focuses on discipleship. We want to encourage each student to grow in their walk with the Lord, and to fully engage with what they are learning at EBI, whether it be on campus or online.

Our on-campus team members — the Dean of Students, Deans of Men, Deans of Women, and Deans of Married Students — value getting to know students through one-on-one time, playing sports together, attending events, and enjoying meals, board games and more in our homes.

Our hope is that these relationships help students personally and practically apply the biblical principles they are learning in class, encourage them in their growth in order to better impact their ministry, and prepare them to make disciples among unreached people groups or wherever the Lord may take them in life.

SINGLE STUDENTS

Dorms: Dorms vary in size and usually house an average of 5 students. Rooms contain furniture provided by the school, including a bed, dresser, desk, and chair. Closet space is limited, yet a space is designated for each student.

Small refrigerators, microwaves, TVs and DVD / Bluray players are permitted. However, please contact the Student Life Department prior to bringing any of these items.

MARRIED STUDENTS

Housing: Married students live in on-campus apartment complexes. Apartments vary in size, and the number of bedrooms depends on the size of the family. Each apartment includes a living room/ kitchen area with a stove and fridge, a bathroom, and a bedroom that will accommodate a queen-sized bed.

Married students are welcome to bring personal furniture and decorations to set up their home. Some furniture is available through the school. Students may bring a small window air conditioner (less than 5000 BTUs and no older than 5 years). Laundry facilities are located in the basement of the apartment complexes; the cost is included in semester fees.

Children: A childcare co-op is available on campus for children 3 years old and younger so that mothers can participate in class.

ALL STUDENTS

Chapel Services: Chapel services are scheduled Monday through Friday. This is a time for the student body to meet together for praise and worship, to listen to special missionary speakers or be challenged from God's Word outside the classroom atmosphere.

Campus Ministry: Based on our desire to help students practically apply biblical truths to everyday life and to keep our schoolwide costs lower, we require each student to fulfill an assigned job on campus. These are primarily cleaning / janitorial jobs. Each job will take approximately two to three hours a week.

Employment: Many students find it necessary to work their way through EBI. It may be wise to start school with a significant amount of savings, keeping in mind that there is a large down payment at the beginning of each semester. Depending on their employment, students have found it difficult at times to pay their monthly payment as well as save for their initial down payment. There are a variety of employment opportunities in the Waukesha area. We ask that students work no more than 25 hours a week.

Music Ministries: Students with musical abilities are welcomed to get involved leading the student body in praise and worship during chapels and other events. Music chosen provides a blend of traditional and contemporary Christian

Intramurals: This program allows staff to participate together in athletics. all skill levels are encouraged to join a

a sport of their choice. Available sports include coed volleyball, men's and women's basketball and soccer. These teams are organized each semester.

Competitive Sports: At times, the school offers opportunities within the community to play in leagues and to compete with other teams..

Student Lounges: Student lounges have amenities such as vending machines, televisions, pool tables and pianos. There is ample seating for friends to hang out or study together.

Gymnasium: The gym is used for indoor soccer, basketball and volleyball. Intramural sports teams are organized each semester. Weight rooms and fitness equipment are also available.

Student Leadership Program: Each semester some students are invited to participate in positions of leadership at EBI. This is an opportunity for additional training for a limited group of students in the area of servant leadership (2 Timothy 2:2). These students have an incredible impact on the community life and ministry of EBI. They serve the student body in the following programs:

- Campus Ministry
- Resident Assistants
- SLAM (Student Life Activities Ministry)
- Kitchen (Dish Crew and Veggie Crew)
- Worship

Special Emphasis Days: A few days are set aside each semester for a special emphasis on world missions, evangelism, prayer, and/or other practical Christian life topics presented by guest speakers.

Student Life Activities: A team of students, advised by staff members, coordinates and facilitates extra-curricular activities throughout the year. Events such as coffee socials, talent nights, and ice-skating socials give students an opportunity for fun and fellowship outside the classroom setting.

Misconduct: EBI's Leadership Team reserves the right to ask any student to leave the school who disqualifies himself/herself through conduct that is not in keeping with Christ-like character as defined in our Student Handbook.

STUDENT GRIEVANCE POLICY

Students who have a specific concern or complaint regarding their experience as a student at EBI are encouraged to use the Student Grievance Form to seek to resolve the issue. Grievances that will be addressed through this grievance process include issues related to student safety, interpersonal conflict or behavioral issues, classroom procedures, and/or adverse department decisions. Any questions related to the completion or use of the Student Grievance Form should be directed to the Dean of Students or the Academic Dean.

ATTENDANCE POLICIES

Students are expected to attend all classes in which they are enrolled. (Attendance for online students is verified through attendance quizzes.) Because unforeseen circumstances do arise, and illness would prevent class attendance, the policy allows for up to two absences per credit hour in any course. Credit for a course may be lost due to excessive absences. A determination will be made by the Academic Dean.

ACADEMIC REVIEW

Academic progress is reviewed at the mid-point and end of each semester. If a student's GPA drops below 2.0, they will be placed on academic probation. If the GPA does not improve to 2.0 or above by the next academic review, the student will be required to take a leave of absence for not less than one semester. After the required leave of absence, the student may reapply.

ACADEMIC RECORDS

Students may inquire at any time about their academic progress in a course. A summary of grades will be given at the end of each semester. Copies of all academic records are kept on file. A student transcript (order online at www.e360bible.org) will be sent upon request at the cost of \$10 per transcript.

TRANSFER CREDITS

Transfer credits may be given for courses taken at other schools if the course content is roughly equivalent to what is offered at EBI. All Bible and missions courses will be considered for transfer. No more than 49% of an EBI diploma/degree can consist of transferred credits.

Many Christian colleges and universities accept EBI credits. It is at the discretion of each individual school as to which and how many EBI credits would be transferable.

A list of schools currently accepting our credits is available on the EBI website.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

EBI grants a diploma, Associate degree, or certificate based on the track selected. The graduation requirements for each are as follows:

Diploma in Biblical Studies:

- Satisfactory completion of the 60 core class credit hours plus 4 elective credits. (64 credits total)
- A minimum GPA of 2.00.
- Satisfactory completion of co-curricular requirements.

Associates of Arts Degree in Biblical Studies:

- Satisfactory completion of the 60 core class credit hours (including the 12 general education credits), 4 elective credits, and transfer of 3 credits of mathematics from another institution of higher learning. (67 credits total)
- A minimum GPA of 2.00.
- Satisfactory completion of co-curricular requirements.

Certificate in Biblical Studies:

- Satisfactory completion of 30 credit hours of EBI course work. (Transfer credits do not apply to the credit hour requirement.)
- A minimum GPA of 2.00.
- Satisfactory completion of co-curricular requirements.

Completion of the diploma or degree is not mandatory for further training with Ethnos360.

ACADEMIC HONORS

To be placed on the Dean's List at graduation, students must have completed a minimum of 64 credits with a minimum GPA of 3.60.

ACADEMIC SCHEDULE

The main purpose of the EBI library is to meet the educational needs of the students and staff. The library has approximately 10,000 volumes including textbooks, Bible commentaries, biographies, theological works, and books related to Christian living. The current library database is digitized and synched with Populi for easy reference. In addition to the on-campus library, every full-time student is issued a license with Logos Bible Software. This license contains a curated library in excess of 500 resources which includes the majority of EBI's required textbooks.

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ETHNOS360 BIBLE INSTITUTE COURSE SEQUENCE

The focus of our course sequence is built on the progressive manner in which God has communicated His Word to us. As we look at Scripture, we find that God introduces Himself and His plan for the ages a little bit at a time.

“I still have many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now.”

John 16:12

This means that the very center of our curriculum is the Word of God, and our method for teaching the Word of God is by starting with Genesis and continuing through to Revelation.

Our desire is to lay a foundation for the Word of God before we begin this study. In our Biblical Foundations course the student is taken through the Bible from the creation of the world to the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ in order to see the theme of redemption woven throughout the Word of God from beginning to end.

In our first doctrine class, Bibliology, we emphasize the authority, inerrancy, canonicity, and preservation of the Bible. Then we begin to take the students into the text of each major section of the Bible. While the student is going through the books of the Bible, they will also be learning how to study the Bible for themselves. In Hermeneutics, the student will be given tools and practical exposure to the rules of Bible interpretation.

We have also included systematic theology courses to pull together all the teaching on major Bible doctrines. Our attempt is to have these classes occur after the student has been exposed to the Bible passages within the biblical theology courses. We believe that it is best for the students to understand the context and background of a passage prior to studying it in the systematic theology courses.

Because of our desire to train students who will be equipped for world evangelization, we have also included specialized classes that are ministry and missions related. These are not directly tied to our theology courses but are meant to be informative and equipping.

We believe that this unique approach to Bible study will enable every Bible student, from new believers to those with many years of experience, to gain the most effective understanding of God's Word.

COURSE INFORMATION

COURSE PREFIXES

Related courses are grouped under prefix designation. It should be noted that some courses could be categorized under several different designations, i.e., many Old and New Testament studies will contain elements of Theology. However, each course is categorized with the best suitable prefix designation.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Courses may be added or dropped at EBI's discretion and may not be reflected in this catalog.

BIBLICAL STUDIES

In the following Biblical Studies courses, students will observe and explore the Bible in an exegetical manner. The goal is to become skilled in interpretation and wise in application. Understanding God's Word is the first step in becoming effective servants of Christ.

BI101 BIBLICAL FOUNDATIONS 1 CREDIT HOUR

Biblical Foundations introduces students to a chronological approach to Scripture. The course calls attention to significant themes found throughout the Bible that lay a firm foundation for understanding the gospel of God's grace.

BI111 PENTATEUCH 3 CREDIT HOURS

Pentateuch is a survey of Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy with emphasis on the biblical theology of these books, their genre, and application. A foundation is laid for the students understanding of the rest of Scripture.

BI112 OLD TESTAMENT HISTORY 3 CREDIT HOURS

As a survey, this course identifies the major contribution of each of the historical books. Emphasis is given to major events that shape the trajectory of Israel's history (e.g. division of the land, cycles of judges, Davidic covenant, establishment of David's throne, divided kingdom through captivity, the decree of Cyrus).

BI122 HERMENEUTICS 3 CREDIT HOURS

This course provides a hands-on approach to Bible interpretation by working through the hermeneutical process with texts of varying genre. This process emphasizes the historical, cultural and literary context of a given text, identifies what the text would have communicated to the original audience and the timeless principles that are relevant today.

BI130 **GOSPEL OF MARK** 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course is a verse-by-verse exposition of the Gospel of Mark. It is taught in a manner that emphasizes the historical and cultural setting in which the book was written, while challenging the student to bridge the gap from the biblical world to their own for the purpose of application. Elective.

BI145 **THE LOVE OF GOD** 1 CREDIT HOUR

Learn a basic understanding of the love of God, relating God's love to a correct view of a fallen world, and emphasizing the value, importance, and power of love in the lives of believers and through believers into the world around them. Elective.

BI163 **INTRODUCTION TO WISDOM BOOKS** 2 CREDIT HOURS

The purpose of this course is to present an overview of Wisdom Literature in the Old Testament, introducing students to forms of poetic literature, purposes of the books, heartbeat of the writers, predominant themes of the books, and see how each book relates to the person and character of God, the walk of the believer, and evil and suffering in the world. The course will focus on Psalms, Proverbs, Job, Ecclesiastes, and the Song of Solomon.

BI167 **PROPHETS** 3 CREDIT HOURS

This course is a survey of major themes in the Old Testament prophets. The Prophets are considered in light of their context in Israel's history. This course concentrates on the concepts of God's punishment, promised restoration, and how the coming of the Messiah relates to these concepts.

BI194 **GOSPELS** 3 CREDIT HOURS

This course is an investigation of the person and work of Christ, His deity and humanity, as seen in the four Gospel accounts. The Gospels are studied from a chronological perspective of Christ's life, harmonizing the four accounts together. This course emphasizes the miracles, teachings, and passion of Christ and relevant application for us today.

BI195 **ACTS** 2 CREDIT HOURS

This course is an exposition of the book of Acts. This course traces the victorious spread of the Gospel from Jerusalem, Judea/Samaria, to the ends of the earth, enabling the student to grasp the significance of the events that God used to bring about this movement. The book of Acts establishes a theological-historical framework for the church and its mission.

BI231 **ROMANS** 3 CREDIT HOURS

This course is a verse-by-verse investigation of the universal depravity and condemnation of humanity and his desperate need of salvation. The course explores God's provision for mankind's salvation as seen in justification, sanctification and glorification. Great attention is given to God's provision to live the Christian life, laying a foundation for continual growth in grace and healthy interaction within the body of Christ. This course traces Paul's vindication of God's dealings with Israel in the scope of redemptive history and challenges the student for practical application of doctrine.

BI232 **GALATIANS** 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course calls attention to the differences between Old Testament life under the Law and the new life under grace lived out by means of the Spirit. This is accomplished by laying a foundation of relevant background material and following the structure of Paul's argument. Paul first addresses justification in the gospel proper and applies the same principles to sanctification.

BI235 **HEBREWS** 2 CREDIT HOURS

This course is an exposition of the book of Hebrews, tracing the author's presentation of Christ and His superiority to angels, prophets, Moses, the Aaronic priesthood, and the Mosaic covenant. Attention is given to the warning passages and the believer's responsibility to walk by faith, following the examples of believers of the past.

BI239 **PRISON EPISTLES** 3 CREDIT HOUR

Through exegetical and expositional methodology, the four books commonly called Paul's "prison epistles" (Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon) will be studied systematically. Special attention will be given to the most important themes in each book.

BI240 **MEMORY** 1 CREDIT HOURS

This course will introduce students to scripture memorization techniques and help them set up their own unique memorization system by showing them what works best for them and by giving them confidence that they can memorize scripture. This will enable them to have God's Word available to think on, encourage themselves with, and to easily share with others in any situation. These same techniques will also aid a church planting candidate in language and culture acquisition. Elective.

BI243 **1 & 2 CORINTHIANS** 3 CREDIT HOURS

This course is an exposition of 1st and 2nd Corinthians. This course provides a detailed explanation of the text based on the historical-cultural context of each book. Emphasis is given to the concepts of church unity in the midst of diversity, the bodily resurrection of Christ and its relevance to the saints, Paul's defense of his apostolic ministry, and the superiority of Paul's New Covenant ministry.

BI255 **META-NARRATIVE OF SCRIPTURE** 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course traces the major plotline of the Bible revealing the cohesiveness of the biblical narrative. This approach interacts with the major covenants of Scripture and the ways in which they impact the trajectory of the biblical narrative. Key biblical themes are traced from Creation to the New Creation, always within the context of the developing plotline of Scripture. This course challenges students to find their place in the story of God as it is worked out in history.

BI272 **CHRISTIAN LIFE** 2 CREDIT HOURS

This course is designed to articulate the biblical teaching and principles of the believer's walk. Attention is given to the various factors that relate to growth and maturity.

BI292 **1 & 2 THESSALONIANS** 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course is a verse-by-verse exposition of 1st and 2nd Thessalonians calling attention to the major themes of perseverance and eschatology, especially noting their correlation. Specific issues such as the rapture, Day of the Lord, and Second Advent are treated as they naturally surface in the text.

BI294 **PASTORAL EPISTLES** 2 CREDIT HOURS

This course is an exposition of 1st Timothy, 2nd Timothy and Titus. These books emphasize the correlation between faith and its practical expression through good works. This course emphasizes Paul's exhortations for the man of God to unashamedly endure in the face of growing compromise in the last days. Attention is given to biblical church structure.

BI297 DANIEL/REVELATION 2 CREDIT HOURS

A biblical exposition of Daniel and Revelation. Daniel addresses God's plan for world history which is consummated with the establishment of the Messiah's kingdom. Revelation addresses the letters to the seven churches, the 70th week of Daniel, and concludes the biblical narrative with the triumph of God's rule over a new heaven and new earth.

BI298 GENERAL EPISTLES 3 CREDIT HOURS

Through exegetical and expositional methodology, the books commonly called the "general epistles" (James, Jude, 1-2 Peter, and 1-3 John) will be studied systematically. Special attention will be given to the most important themes in each book.

EVANGELISM

In the following Evangelism courses, students will be introduced to and explore various religious beliefs which permeate the world today. Instruction will be given on how to evaluate the worldview accompanying a given belief system as well as how to reach those of other beliefs with the gospel of Jesus Christ.

EV123 EVANGELISM IN A POSTMODERN WORLD 2 CREDIT HOURS

This course is a study of biblical principles and methodologies related to evangelism. Emphasis is given to worldview, epistemology, and ways in which spiritual need can be exposed.

EV140 CREATION/EVOLUTION 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course is an evaluation of Biblical creationism as described in Genesis 1-3, and the worldview of Darwinian evolution which denies God's intervention and depends instead upon accidental and blind natural processes to account for the origin of life. The impossibility of Darwinian evolution is considered in detail, along with God's intervention and design as the only reasonable source of life and of mankind. Many aspects of biology and related subjects are discussed, each of which clearly depend upon information which only God can provide. Elective.

EV155 CHRISTIAN APOLOGETICS 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course provides instruction in defending the faith and challenging opposing worldviews with biblical truth. Attention is given to major contemporary attacks against Christianity, while providing students with the opportunity to gain hands-on experience in confronting these attacks. Elective.

EV258 WORLD RELIGIONS 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course is designed to help students to understand the fundamental beliefs of each of the major world religions (Animism, Hinduism, Judaism, Buddhism, Islam), in order to better reach individuals in each of these religions with the gospel of Christ. Elective.

MISSIONS

In the following Missions courses, students will explore the subjects of prayer, cross-cultural ministry and missions in history. They will be introduced to Ethnos360 and the foundational methodology used by Ethnos360 in church planting. The aim of these courses is to expose students to the world beyond them and the preparation essential for cross-cultural ministry.

MI143 PRINCIPLES AND PRACTICE OF PRAYER 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course establishes the foundation for the believer's prayer life, giving emphasis to Paul's prayers, and providing a framework for the practicum portion of this course. The practicum portion of the course focuses on praying for those involved in cross-cultural missions, as well as personal praise and petition. Elective.

MI165 NEXT STEPS & PARTNERSHIP DEVELOPMENT 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course is designed to equip and motivate students to begin developing ministry partners. Students will gain an understanding of biblical principles relating to partnership development, and a working knowledge of how to effectively communicate their ministries to potential partners. Elective.

MI173 BIBLE BASIS OF MISSIONS 1 CREDIT HOUR

In order to lay the foundations for learning, students will be introduced to the terminology that is often used within missiology. They will then study the purpose for missions, God's global plan for the redemption of mankind, and the means by which this plan is accomplished. Finally, students will be challenged to see missions not as a task that must be undertaken but rather as a privilege to partner with God in reaching the lost.

MI273 INTRO TO CROSS-CULTURAL CHURCH PLANTING: EBI 1 CREDIT HOUR

The objective of this class is to introduce the student to the blessings and complexities of fulfilling the Great Commission in the context of an unreached people group. Animism will be explored, along with the hurdles involved in reaching people with this world view. Students will be exposed to the value/imperative of teaching in the vernacular of the host people, and the importance of systematic study of the host culture prior to teaching. Students will be presented with the importance of chronological Bible teaching as the best method of teaching for people with little or no knowledge of the scriptures. This course can be replaced with or taken in addition to MN242.

MINISTRY

In the following Ministry courses, students will acquire important tools necessary for ministry. This includes discipleship, counseling, public speaking and partnership building.

MN240 LEADERSHIP PRACTICUM 1 CREDIT HOUR

This practicum is offered to students chosen by the Student Life Department to be student leaders. Attention is given to practical leadership training relevant to the areas of leadership in which student leaders serve. Elective.

MN275 PRINCIPLES OF WRITTEN COMMUNICATION 2 CREDIT HOURS

Communication is the foundation for all human relationships. This course is designed to strengthen the written communication skills of enrolled students. Writing principles, Turabian formatting, research methods, essay and research paper writing will all be covered.

MN278 PUBLIC SPEAKING 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course is a study and practice of the major principles and techniques of public speaking. Attention is given to the specific contexts in which Ethnos360 missionaries will be communicating their ministries to ministry partners.

MN290 DISCIPLESHIP PRACTICUM 1 0 CREDIT HOUR

This course is a discipleship practicum designed to enable the student to integrate core biblical principles into their daily walk with the Lord. Students meet with a mentor weekly to discuss topics selected by the EBI discipleship team utilizing discussion questions that we crafted to lead the student and mentor through these various topics. This course is part of the online program.

MN292 DISCIPLESHIP PRACTICUM 2 0 CREDIT HOUR

This course builds on course MN290 and completes what EBI has identified as foundational biblical principles necessary for a healthy walk and ministry. Students meet with a mentor weekly to discuss topics selected by the EBI discipleship team utilizing discussion questions to lead the student and mentor through these various topics. This course is a part of the online program.

MN293 DISCIPLESHIP PRACTICUM 3 1/2 CREDIT HOUR

This course is designed to give the student practical experience communicating core Biblical principles in the context of a discipling relationship. The student will meet with their disciple weekly, using the book, "By This Name" and the accompanying workbook. A holistic approach to spiritual growth is encouraged. This course is a part of the online program. Elective.

MN296 DISCIPLESHIP PRACTICUM 4 1/2 CREDIT HOUR

This course builds on MN294 and is designed to give the student practical experience communicating core Biblical principles in the context of a discipling relationship. The student will meet with their disciple weekly to discuss selected topics regarding the Christian life. A holistic approach to spiritual growth is encouraged. This course is a part of the online program. Elective.

SOCIOLOGY

In the following Sociology courses, students will gain skills necessary for effective learning, healthy relationships, and communication.

SO157 FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT 1 CREDIT HOUR

A biblical approach to stewardship as it relates to money and its management. This course deals with practical matters like budgeting and record keeping. Other topics include balancing a bank account, the dangers and benefits of credit card use, taxes, and types of insurance. Elective.

SO158 CONFLICT RESOLUTION 1 CREDIT HOUR

The course lays down important foundations for minimizing and resolving interpersonal conflicts. It will focus on five main concepts: human dignity and respect, learning to listen and understand what people are trying to say, problems and roots of anger, principles for resolving differences, and the place and power of forgiveness. Elective.

SO228 FAMILY RELATIONSHIP 1 CREDIT HOUR

A study of biblical standards for the Christian family, including roles and responsibilities toward God and one another. It focuses on husband-wife and parent-child relationships. God's original intention for marriage, and the roles of men and women in marriage are addressed, while the inherent differences between men and women are woven throughout the course. The concepts of leaving and cleaving, finance, communication, sexuality, and to some extent, dating are explored to the end that the student's relationship to God and his/her family will be deepened.

SO235 SELF & SOCIAL IDENTITY 2 CREDIT HOURS

This course is a systematic study of the believer's relationships with the various "communities" he or she is involved with, including family and dating relationships, conflict resolution, and gender issues. The goal is to give the believer a right view of self and a right view of others.

THEOLOGY

In the following Theology courses, students will explore various theological systems/theories and study in-depth the major theologies of the Bible, including God, Christ, the Holy Spirit, man, sin, salvation and end times. The goal of these courses is to prepare the students to evaluate and then make discerning judgments based on Scripture.

TH135 THEOLOGY 1 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course is a study of the origin and development of God's word including inspiration, revelation, canonicity, authority, and translations.

TH143 UNDERSTANDING SUFFERING 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course is a study of the biblical teaching on the reality, extent, origin, causes, and purposes of suffering in the world and its impact on personal value systems. Elective.

TH145 ELECTION 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course is a study of the New Testament doctrine of election with a focus on incorporating the biblical data on faith to arrive at a holistic view of this important concept. Elective. Prerequisite: BI231

TH155 THE REFORMATION AND RISE OF DENOMINATIONS 1 CREDIT HOUR

This course will review the history of the Reformation and the origin of the five churches that emerged: Lutheran, Reformed, Anabaptist, Anglican, and Roman Catholic. The course will consider the events that produced the Reformation and the theological differences between these churches. It will also consider how these churches eventually produced other contemporary denominations. Elective.

TH190 THEOLOGY 2 2 CREDIT HOURS

This course is a study of the biblical doctrine of God in the persons of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit including His self-revelation, existence, essence, attributes, names, and the role and work of each member of the Trinity.

TH235 THEOLOGY 3 2 CREDIT HOURS

This course covers the doctrine of man (Anthropology), sin (Hamartiology) and salvation (Soteriology). Anthropology includes

the creation and fall of man, his material and immaterial parts (the body, soul, and spirit), his state of innocence, fall and depravity. Hamartiology looks at the origin of sin, the effect of sin and the means for victory over sin. Soteriology covers the meaning of substitution, redemption, reconciliation, propitiation, justification and adoption.

TH260 THEOLOGY 4 2 CREDIT HOURS

This course is a systematic study of the doctrines of the church (Ecclesiology), angels (Angelology), and end times (Eschatology). Each is studied from information gathered systematically from the Bible. Ecclesiology addresses the church's nature, purpose, ordinances, leadership and discipline. Angelology looks at creation, purposes, fall, present activity of angels along with their and interaction with mankind. Major views on the Millennium, Tribulation and Rapture are addressed in Eschatology.


