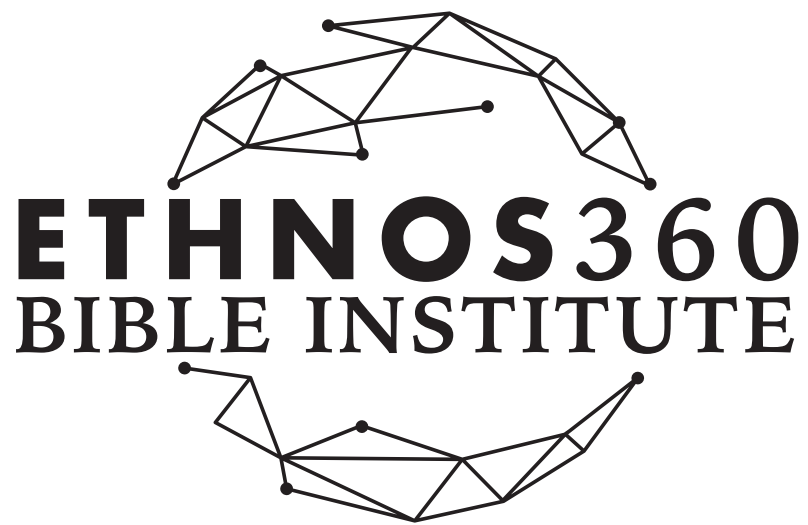

At EBI, you can expect:


1. A quality Bible education

## **PAY YOUR ROOM DEPOSIT (DUE JULY 1ST)**

Your room deposit (\$100 for singles, \$200 for marrieds) secures you a spot in campus housing. You can pay your deposit right now online, or you can mail in a check. The deadline for your room deposit is July 1st.

# Arrival Information

## **WELCOME!**

During registration weekend we have students arriving from all over the country and all over the world! As a service to incoming freshmen, we can help you arrange for airport pickup. If you need help getting from the airport or station to EBI, please discuss it with your respective dean.

## **SINGLE STUDENTS**

Please plan to arrive on one of two designated move-in days. Friday, August 23 from 9am-9pm or Saturday, August 24 from 9am-9pm.

## **MARRIED STUDENTS**

Please contact the Deans of Married Students as you are making plans for arrival. It may be possible to arrive before the move in days, but it's essential that you communicate with us. We recommend arriving early enough to be moved in and unpacked before registration starts.

## **AIRPORT TRANSPORTATION**

If you fly, we recommend that you fly to General Mitchell International Airport (MKE) in Milwaukee.

If you feel that you need to fly into an airport other than MKE, we ask that you discuss this with your respective dean before purchasing tickets. If you fly into any airport other than MKE, it will be your responsibility to get from that airport to EBI.

If you choose to fly to Chicago, Coach USA has a shuttle that runs from O'Hare right up to Waukesha. It's currently \$37.40 per person. You can find shuttle information at <https://coachusa.com>

## **BUS OR AMTRAK STATION**

The Milwaukee Intermodal Station [Milwaukee, WI - Intermodal Station \(MKE\) | Amtrak](#) is a combined BUS and Amtrak TRAIN depot. It is downtown at 433 W St. Paul Avenue. If you need help getting from the station to EBI, please discuss it with your respective dean.

## **CHURCH INVOLVEMENT**

Ethnos360 is not a church. We exist to support and assist the local church and we are not affiliated with a denomination. # Housing Information

## SINGLE STUDENTS

### DORMS

Our desire is to provide a living environment which is conducive to study and comfortable for everyone. Your dorm will consist of a combination sitting/study room and bedrooms. It will be furnished with bunk beds, dressers, and closet space. In the sitting room, we will provide a desk, chair, bookshelf, and couches. Because you will be sharing a room with others, there will be a limited amount of storage space per student. Restrooms and showers are located nearby. On the ground floor we have a central laundry facility.

### STORAGE

Limited storage is available for suitcases, totes and out of season clothing.

### MEALS

For resident single students, all meals in the dining hall are included in your student fees.

# HOUSING INFORMATION

## MARRIED STUDENTS

### APARTMENTS

Married student apartments are located near our main building. Most apartments have a living room, kitchen, dining area and bathroom. The number of bedrooms depends on family size and apartment availability. There is a central laundry facility on the ground floor of the main building and in the basement of the apartment buildings.

### STORAGE

Limited storage is available for suitcases, totes and out of season clothing.

### MEALS

Married students living on campus are provided with a refrigerator and kitchen. It's your responsibility to prepare meals for your family. Meals in the dining hall are not included with your fees, but you can occasionally sign up for meals in the dining hall and charge those to your school account.

# What to Bring

## SINGLE and MARRIED STUDENTS

### CLOTHING

We acknowledge there are different personal preferences and convictions regarding appearance and dress. We request that our students appear neat and modest while avoiding extremes. Each believer bears the responsibility before God to be sensitive to the people around us.

Please recognize that there is appropriate attire for specific settings: classroom, dorm halls, dining room, weight room, gym, etc.

Due to the ever-changing weather in Wisconsin, you will want to bring clothes appropriate for both warm and very cold temperatures.

### CLASSROOM and CHAPEL DRESS CODE

Our desire is to create a comfortable learning environment with minimal distractions to students, teachers, and guests that is considerate of the diverse backgrounds represented. We are asking students to adhere to the following parameters:

1. Guys may wear jeans that are not excessively ripped, khakis or nice shorts, button-down shirts, polo shirts, or tee shirts with sleeves and no rips or holes.
2. Ladies may wear jeans that are not excessively ripped, modest length shorts, skirts or dresses, and shirts/sweaters that cover the midriff and are not excessively low-cut. Leggings may be worn with dresses or long sweaters/shirts.
3. Clothing with messaging contrary to EBI values is not permitted.
4. For all students, footwear is required.

### PHONE OR HANDHELD DEVICE

A handheld device with Bluetooth is needed for attendance.

### LAPTOP AND PRINTER

All students should have their own personal laptop for completing research, writing papers, turning in assignments, and even testing electronically. It is helpful to bring a printer but not required. Most of the assignments are turned in electronically, and there is a printer available in the library.

## **MINIMUM COMPUTER REQUIREMENTS**

The minimum requirement is 8GB of RAM and a 250GB hard drive with at least 100GB of FREE space. All students should have their own personal laptop for completing research, writing papers, turning in assignments, and taking tests electronically. Please note: A chrome book, netbook, tablet, or iPad is insufficient for the software and apps you will be using on a regular basis.

## **DECORATIONS**

You may bring decorations but consider that space is limited and only pins and thumbtacks are permitted to fasten items to the wall.

## **PETS**

Fish contained in 1-gallon bowls or smaller are permitted. No other pets allowed.

## **ITEMS NOT ALLOWED:**

Please do not bring electric blankets, space heaters or mini refrigerators.

# **What to Bring**

## **SINGLE STUDENTS**

### **BEDDING/LINENS**

You'll need your own pillow, pillowcases, bed sheets sized twin XL (extra-long), bedspread and blankets, towels, and wash cloths. The school will provide a mattress cover for you to purchase.

### **PERSONAL ITEMS**

Items you may consider bringing include a laundry bag or basket, sports equipment, desk lamp, fan, iron, and small pictures. A carryall or organizer is helpful for toiletry items. If you plan to bring a window air conditioner, please contact your respective dean first since we only need one per room. Mini fridges are unnecessary as refrigerators are provided on each wing.

# What to Bring

## MARRIED STUDENTS

### HOUSEKEEPING ITEMS

We do not provide household/housekeeping items. Bring dishes, pots, pans, iron, towels, linens, blankets, fan, clock, lamps, and you may want a small window air conditioner.

### FURNITURE

We recommend you bring your own furniture, however, keep in mind that apartment sizes vary. If you are unable to bring furniture, there is a limited amount of furniture available for use on a first-come, first-served basis.

### APPLIANCES

Refrigerators and stoves are available for all married apartments. If you choose to bring your own stove, please check with our dean of married students. You may also want to bring a microwave oven, fan, small air conditioner, TV, etc. No space heaters or electric blankets, please.



# Academics

## OVERVIEW

Our school motto is "Where Bible Education and Missions Are One." With this in mind, we trust your training experience at EBI will be life changing. You will be studying the great doctrines of the Bible. Your instructors will be emphasizing the necessity of living a godly life, as well as the Christian's responsibility and purpose in taking the good news of Christ to a lost world.

## REGISTRATION

You will register for classes during your initial days on campus. You will be taking approximately 15 required credit hours per semester and one or more electives.

## CLASS SCHEDULE

All required classes are held Monday-Friday from 8:00am to 11:30am for section A, and 9:00am to 12:30pm for section B. Elective classes are taught during the afternoon at 1:10pm. This generally allows for free time in the afternoons and evening for employment, study, and free time.

## BIBLE SOFTWARE/TEXTBOOKS

Most textbooks you will need are available in digital format within the Logos Bible Software. You will receive a license when you arrive. Occasionally you might be required to purchase textbooks or borrow them from the library.

## TRANSFER CREDITS

If you have taken Bible courses at other Christian colleges and want to receive credit for those at EBI, please have an official transcript sent to the education office [ebi\\_education@ntm.org](mailto:ebi_education@ntm.org). A brief description of the courses you have taken would be helpful as well. Contact the Registrar regarding transfer credits. # Campus Life

## CAMPUS EVENTS

## WORKING AS A STUDENT

## THE WARM SEASON

Lasts 3.7 months, from May 27 to September 18, with an average daily high temperature above 71°F. The hottest day of the year is July 19, with an average high of 82°F and low of 63°F.

## THE COLD SEASON

Lasts for 3.1 months, from December 1 to March 5, with an average daily high temperature below 39°F. The coldest day of the year is January 29, with an average low of 15°F and high of 28°F

## DISTANCE FROM

Milwaukee—17 miles

Madison—66 miles

Chicago—105 miles

Green Bay—136 miles

## MAJOR HIGHWAYS

I-94 runs East and West through Waukesha connecting to Milwaukee in the East, Madison in the West, and Chicago to the South. Waukesha has a centralized location with proximity to bus, rail, and air transportation.

## PARKS

Waukesha County has eight different parks including Fox Brook Park, Fox River Park, Menomonee Park, Minooka Park, Mukwonago Park, Muskego Park, Naga-Waukee Park, and Nashotah Park. *"From swimming to camping to hiking and cross-country skiing, each park has its own personality."*

## **OUR IMMEDIATE NEIGHBORHOOD**

Ethnos360 Bible Institute is located on a beautiful campus in the heart of Waukesha. Coffee shops, restaurants, and shops in our downtown district are within walking distance. Students often walk to Frame Park to play beach volleyball, walk, or bike on the trails by the Fox River or walk through the formal gardens. All the major stores and restaurants are within close driving distance.
